

Research Assistant – School of Psychology and Humanities – Grade E

Job Description

Purpose

To be responsible for the day-to-day operation of the data collection and analysis phase of the project, *Exploring Police Roles in Mental Health Crises*. This project focuses on delivering psychosis training to police constabularies in the Northwest and conducting qualitative research on police responses to mental health crises and public perceptions of these responses.

Duties

1. Under the direction and guidance of Dr. Carolina Campodonico, assist with the qualitative and quantitative data collection, input/cleansing, and analysis as per defined research protocols, including post-training feedback and longitudinal assessments.
2. Manage project data, including setting up files for training evaluation and interview transcripts, and conducting literature searches and reviews relevant to police responses to mental health crises and public trust.
3. Attend project-planning, operational, and steering group meetings to ensure alignment with project goals.
4. Assist in preparing documentation, such as policy briefs and training materials, and in feeding back information to police constabularies and other stakeholders.
5. Contribute to the development of future research and support Dr. Campodonico in preparing bids for research grants and collaborations with policymakers.
6. Provide administrative support for training sessions, interviews, and research dissemination, including conferences.
7. Adhere to ethical standards for research and ensure confidentiality of all data, particularly in sensitive contexts involving police and public participants.
8. With regards to the nature of your role and its impact upon our students, make an active contribution to and support the improvement of the student experience
9. Carry out additional duties as determined by Dr. Campodonico to meet project objectives.
